

Supporting the health of YOUNG PEOPLE IN SOLIHULL

A summary report of the Health Related Behaviour Survey 2014

These results are the compilation of data collected from a sample of primary pupils aged 6 to 11 and secondary pupils aged 12 to 15 in Solihull during Spring 2014. This survey was funded through Local Authority commissioning for Public Health and for Children & Families. It was supported and facilitated by advisers within Solihull Education Improvement Service.

Teachers were informed on how to collect the most reliable data.

Pupils in Years 2, 4 and 6 in the primary schools and Years 8 and 10 in the secondary schools completed either a paper based or an online version of the Health Related Behaviour Questionnaire.

A total of 8717 pupils took part in 66 Solihull Infant, Primary, Secondary and Special schools.

Cross-phase links

Many of the questions in the primary and secondary versions

of the questionnaire are identical or very similar. Some of these questions are presented on page 7 of this document so that behaviour can be seen across the age range.

Trend data

Solihull schools have surveyed in previous years. Some interesting changes in the data are noted on page 8.

Reference sample

Solihull data have been compared with a compilation of survey areas that have completed similar versions of the questionnaire. These areas include Bristol, Camden, Cornwall, Ealing, Oldham, Rochdale and Wakefield.

A selection of some of the statistically significant differences, where the level seen in the Solihull data is either 5% above or below that in the wider reference data, is indicated by the symbol  on pages 4 and 6.

Solihull Primary school pupils in Year 2 (ages 6-7)

BACKGROUND

- 77% of pupils described themselves as white. 10% described themselves as Asian and 7% described themselves as mixed race.
- 38% of pupils were the eldest child in their family.

Spending Money

- The main items Year 2 pupils spent money on were:


- 59% of pupils report saving their money.

HEALTHY EATING

- 1% of pupils had nothing to eat or drink for breakfast on the day of the survey. 59% of pupils had cereal.
- 39% of pupils have chips/roast potatoes, 38% crisps and 45% sweets and chocolates 'a lot'. 59% eat fresh fruit, 37% dairy produce and 47% vegetables 'a lot'.
- 30% drink fizzy drinks 'a lot'.
- 60% said they had been to the dentist in the last year, 20% said they hadn't and 20% said they didn't know.
- 73% said they cleaned their teeth at least twice the day before. 6% said not at all.

EMOTIONAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING



- 37% of pupils had high self-esteem scores.
- 45% of pupils said that they worry 'a lot' about their family.**
- 32% said they worry about friendships and 31% said they worry about keeping well.
- 22% said they worry 'a lot' about school-work.
- 59% said that they like going to school, 27% said sometimes and 14% said they didn't.



LEISURE AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY


- 63% of pupils said they spent time watching television after school the day before the survey, 36% played computer games and 25% went to a club.

- 28% said that they go to an after school club and 37% said that they swim 'a lot'.
- 43% of girls said that they dance 'a lot'. 52% of boys said that they play football 'a lot'.





ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO

- 29% of pupils reported that they had tasted alcohol.
- 32% of pupils said that someone who lived in their house smoked.**
- 6% said that they would smoke when they are older; 19% said 'maybe'.




STAYING SAFE

- 61% of pupils say that they never feel scared to go to school because of other children. 15% said they did and 24% said sometimes.**



- 65% of pupils said that they always wash their hands after going to the toilet, 4% said never.
- 12% of pupils said that they had asthma, 17% said they didn't know if they did.
- 56% of pupils had used the Internet at home in the previous week. 78% said that they use the Internet for playing games. 23% said they use the Solgrid and 12% said they use Facebook, Bebo etc.
- 36% said that they use the Internet when their parents/cares aren't in the room. 62% said that their parents/carers have rules about what they are allowed to do online.
- 8% of pupils said that they chat to people online who they have never met. **67% said they have been told how to stay safe when they chat to people online.**




Solihull Primary school pupils in Years 4 & 6 (ages 8-9 and 10-11)

BACKGROUND

- 78% of pupils described themselves as white UK. 11% describes themselves as Asian and 5% described themselves as mixed.
- 42% were the eldest child in their family.

HEALTHY EATING

- 2% of pupils had nothing to eat or drink for breakfast on the day of the survey. 52% of pupils had cereal.
- 21% of pupils have chips/roast potatoes, 29% crisps and 31% sweets and chocolates 'on most days'. 58% eat fresh fruit, 54% dairy produce and 50% vegetables 'on most days'.
- 26% of pupils had 5 or more portions of fruit and vegetables the day before the survey.**
- 26% of pupils said that they would like to lose weight.




Dental care

- 84% of pupils reported that they cleaned their teeth at least twice a day (the recommended frequency); however, 20% reported that they had to have a filling last time they visited the dentist.

EMOTIONAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING

- 38% of pupils had high self-esteem scores.**
- 29% of pupils worried 'quite a lot' or 'a lot' about school tests, 24% about family relationships and 22% about keeping healthy.
- 13% of boys and 18% of girls worried about how their body changes as they grow up.




LEISURE AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

- 74% of pupils said they spent time watching television after school on the day before the survey, 53% played sport the night before.
- 81% of pupils reported that they enjoyed physical activities 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'.
- 70% considered themselves 'fit' or 'very fit'.

PUBERTY AND GROWING UP

- 70% of Year 6 boys and 83% of Year 6 girls said their parents had talked to them about how their body changes as they grow up.



- 60% of Year 6 pupils said their teachers had talked to them about how their body changes as they grow up.
- 70% of Year 6 pupils said that they thought they knew enough about how their body changes as they get older.
- 71% of Year 6 boys and 78% of Year 6 girls said their parents had talked to them about how their feelings/emotions change as they grow up. 45% of Year 6 boys and 53% of Year 6 girls said their teachers had.


DRUGS, ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO

Drugs


- 57% of pupils reported that their parents had talked to them about drugs. 44% said their teachers had.
- 1% of Year 6 pupils said that they had been offered cannabis and 2% said they had been offered other drugs.

Alcohol

- 20% of boys and 11% of girls in Year 6 said they had ever had an alcoholic drink.




- 3% of boys and 2% of girls in Year 6 said they drank alcohol on at least one day in the last week.
- When asked about whether their parent's know if they drink alcohol, **84% of Year 6 pupils said they don't drink alcohol**, 13% said their parents always know, 1% said 'usually' and 2% said 'sometimes' or 'never'.




Tobacco

- 98% of pupils said they have never smoked at all. 1% smoked during the last seven days.
- 2% of pupils think they will smoke when they are older, 8% said maybe and 90% said no.




STAYING SAFE

- 64% of pupils say that they are 'never' afraid to go to school because of bullying.
- 25% said that they had been bullied at or near school within the last 12 months.
- Behaviour reported as causing distress included being teased or made fun of, being called nasty names and being pushed or hit for no reason.
- Of those pupils who said that they had been bullied in the month prior to the survey 37% said it happened outside at breaktime and 27% said in a classroom at breaktime. 16% reported being bullied during a lesson.
- 22% of pupils reported that they thought they were bullied because of the way they looked. 14% said because of their size or weight.
- 9% thought they were bullied because of their race, colour or religion or culture. 10% said because they do well in tests.



- 76% of pupils said that their school takes bullying seriously.

- 4% of pupils reported that they never or hardly ever feel safe at playtime (including dinnertime). 18% said they sometimes feel safe and 78% said they often feel safe.



- 80% of pupils had used the Internet at home in the last week. 84% said they use the Internet for playing games, 64% said they use it for school work. 40% said looking at web pages about their hobbies and interests.


- 62% of pupils said that they use the Internet unsupervised when their parents/carers aren't in the room. 73% said that parents/carers have rules about what sites they can use.

- 15% of pupils said they chat to people online that they have never met.

- 91% said they have been told how to stay safe while chatting online.

- 3% said they had received a chat message that scared them or made them upset.

- 30% of pupils worried 'quite a lot' or 'a lot' about crime.



LEISURE TIME

- 72% of pupils said that they felt happy during playtimes.
- 92% of pupils said they spent time chatting/talking during school playtimes. 89% said they played running/skipping games/tag and 68% played ball games. 61% said they often spent time queuing for lunch at least sometimes.
- 52% of boys and 59% of girls in Year 6 spent time doing homework on the evening before the survey.
- 49% said they read a book for pleasure the night before, 53% played computer games and 36% said they went to a club the night before.

SPENDING MONEY

- The main items Year 6 pupils spent money on were:

SIGNIFICANT DIFFERENCES BETWEEN SOLIHULL AND THE SHEU REFERENCE SAMPLE

For most questions in the survey, Solihull primary pupils give similar responses to those in the SHEU reference sample. The following are a selection of the interesting differences noted.


- 71% of pupils in Solihull said that in their school, people with different backgrounds are valued. This is higher than the 63% saying this in the SHEU reference sample.
- 45% of pupils in Solihull said that when a friend asks them to do something they don't want to do, they can 'usually or always' say no. This is lower than the 53% who said this in the reference sample.
- 36% of pupils said that they feel afraid of going to school because of bullying at least 'sometimes'. This is higher than the 30% of pupils saying this in the reference sample.
- 58% of pupils said that they eat fresh fruit 'on most days' This is lower than the 63% seen in the reference sample.
- 42% of pupils said that they walked to school on the day of the survey. This is lower than the 48% reported in the reference sample.
- 85% of pupils wash their hands 'whenever possible' after visiting the toilet compared with 80% of the reference sample.

Solihull Secondary school pupils in Year 8 and Year 10 (ages 12-13 and 14-15)

- 26% of pupils reported a fear of going to school at least sometimes because of bullying.
- 18% said that they had been bullied at or near school in the last 12 months.
- 46% of pupils had high self-esteem scores.

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

- 47% of the Year 10 boys consider themselves 'fit' or 'very fit' compared with only 23% of the Year 10 girls.



- 42% of pupils said they enjoyed physical activities 'a lot'.
- 34% of pupils said that they had been physically active five days or more in the last week, for at least an hour.
- 59% of pupils said that they had been involved in physical activity at school for 2 or more hours in the past 7 days.


RELATIONSHIPS AND SEXUAL HEALTH

- 20% of pupils (39% Year 10 girls) said that they knew where to get emergency contraception free of charge. 53% of Year 10 pupils know where to get condoms free of charge.
- 65% of pupils said that they thought condoms were reliable methods in stopping infections like HIV/AIDS.
- 51% of pupils said that if they had a sexual health concern, they would know where to go to get help.
- 5% of pupils (10% of Year 10 girls) said that a boy/girlfriend had pressured them to have sex or do sexual things.
- 13% of pupils said they had been in a relationship with someone who had been angry or jealous when they wanted to spend time with friends; 10% said their boy/girlfriend kept checking their phone.
- 7% said that a boy/girlfriend had used hurtful or threatening language towards them.
- 5% of Year 10 pupils said that they had been hit by a partner. 68% of Year 10 pupils said if this happened to them they would know what to do.

DRUGS, ALCOHOL & TOBACCO

Drugs

- 21% of Solihull secondary pupils are 'fairly sure' or 'certain' that they know someone who takes drugs.
- 26% of Year 10 boys and 21% of Year 10 girls have been offered cannabis.




BACKGROUND

- 80% of pupils described themselves as white UK. 8% described themselves as Asian and 4% as black. 5% described themselves as mixed.
- 65% of pupils live with mother and father together.

HEALTHY EATING

- 45% of pupils 'often' or 'always' consider their health when choosing what to eat.




- 8% of Year 10 boys and 14% of Year 10 girls said they had nothing to eat or drink for breakfast on the day of the survey.

- 29% of pupils said they ate sweets and chocolates on most days. 25% said they ate crisps on most days.

- 53% ate dairy produce, 36% fresh fruit and 44% vegetables 'on most days'.

- 16% said that they had five or more portions of fruit and vegetables the day before.



- 12% of pupils had no water to drink on the day before the survey, 29% had around a litre or more.

EMOTIONAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING

- 67% of pupils reported that, in general, they were 'quite a lot' or 'a lot' satisfied with their life.
- Parents are the most popular sources of support for boys and girls.

- The top four worries for Year 8 pupils were:


- These changed to the following for Year 10 pupils:

- When asked if they had taken an illegal drug in the month before the survey 0% of Year 8 pupils said they had. This rose to 5% of Year 10 pupils.
- 2% of Year 8 boys, 1% of Year 8 girls and 11% of Year 10 pupils said they had ever taken an illegal drug.
- 6% of Year 10 pupils have taken an illegal drug and alcohol on the same occasion.

Alcohol


- 42% of pupils said that they have never had an alcoholic drink.
- 5% of Year 8 pupils had an alcoholic drink on at least one day in the past week. 23% of Year 10 pupils did the same.**



- 9% of Year 10 pupils said that they got drunk in the last week.
- 3% of Year 10 pupils bought alcohol from an off-licence that should sell only to over-eighteens.
- 6% of pupils said their parents never or only sometimes know if they drink at home.

Tobacco


- 31% of pupils reported that there is someone who smokes indoors in their home (including themselves) on most days.**
- Boys: 1% of Year 8 boys and 7% of Year 10 boys reported that they smoke occasionally or regularly.
- Girls: 0% of Year 8 girls and 10% of Year 10 girls reported that they smoke occasionally or regularly.
- Of those who said they smoke, 64% said they could stop if they wanted to, 27% said they didn't know and 9% said they didn't think they could.



STAYING SAFE

- 12% of Year 10 pupils said that their safety had been put at risk on an occasion when they had used alcohol.
- 93% of pupils had used the Internet at home in the past week. 89% said they access the Internet when their parents/carers aren't in the room.
- 76% of pupils said they access the Internet for using Facebook etc. 84% said for schoolwork, 71% said for chatting and 47% said for uploading videos/photos etc.
- 37% (62% Year 10 boys) said that they had seen pictures online that were for adults only.
- 29% of pupils said that they had seen pictures online that had upset them.


- 17% of pupils said that someone had shared an image of them via social media that made them unhappy.**
- 14% of pupils rated the safety of their area, when going out after dark, as 'poor' or 'very poor'. 2% said this about going out during the day.



- 8% said that they had been the victim of violence or aggression in the area where they live in the past 12 months.
- 5% of pupils reported that they were 'fairly sure' or 'certain' that they or their friends carried weapons or other things for protection when going out.

ECONOMIC WELL-BEING

- 53% reported that they expected to take several GCSEs and get good grades (A - C).**
- 47% of pupils want to continue in full time education after leaving school; 57% want to get training for a skilled job.
- 17% of pupils have a regular paid job; the most common forms of work for pupils are paper/leaflet rounds, paid housework and babysitting.
- 27% of pupils said that they look after, or help to look after someone at home on a regular basis. 5% of pupils described themselves as a 'young carer'.



SIGNIFICANT DIFFERENCES BETWEEN SOLIHULL AND THE SHEU REFERENCE SAMPLE

For most questions in the survey, Solihull secondary pupils give similar responses to those in the SHEU reference sample. The following are a selection of the interesting differences noted.

- 80% of the Solihull 2014 secondary sample describe themselves as 'white UK'. This is higher than the 72% saying this in the SHEU wider sample.
- 53% of Year 10 pupils in Solihull said they know where to get condoms free of charge. This is lower than the 71% of pupils in the reference sample.
- 48% of pupils in Solihull said that they had a school lunch the day before. This is lower than the 54% of pupils saying this in the wider sample.
- 36% of pupils said that they eat fresh fruit 'on most days'. This is lower than the 42% seen in the wider sample.
- 14% of pupils said that they had an alcoholic drink in the last 7 days. This is lower than the 21% seen in the wider sample.
- 21% of pupils said that they know someone personally who uses drugs. This is lower than the 40% of pupils in the wider sample.
- 46% of pupils recorded levels of high self-esteem compared with 39% of pupils in the wider sample.


Cross-phase data

The following is a small selection of data relating to the set of questions found in the early, primary and secondary versions of the questionnaire. It is always interesting to see how young people change as they grow up.

HEALTHY EATING

Eating fresh fruit?

- Primary pupils are likely to eat fruit 'on most days' than secondary aged pupils are. Girls are also ahead of the boys. 58% of primary pupils compared with 36% of secondary pupils.




? Can 5 a day messages be promoted further to all ages?

- The proportion of primary and secondary pupils eating cereals for breakfast is higher in primary at 52% than secondary at 39%.
- 90% of primary pupils said that they had breakfast at home compared with 69% of secondary pupils. 5% of primary pupils had something on the way to school compared with 9% of secondary pupils.

SMOKING

Have you ever smoked? – Not even tried

- There are clear differences with age. 98% of Year 6 pupils compare with 92% of Year 8 and 70% of Year 10 pupils saying this.



? Can more be done to encourage Year 8 pupils not to start smoking?

EMOTIONAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING

How much do you worry about...?

- Older pupils are more likely to worry about the way they look compared with the younger pupils. 18% of primary pupils compared with 36% of secondary pupils. Girls worry more about this than boys do.
- There was little difference in the figures for pupils worrying about problems with friends or family relationships.
- 25% of primary pupils said that they had been bullied at or near school in the last 12 months. For secondary aged pupils, 18% of pupils said the same.

? Is it possible to ease children's worries? Do they have time to talk, at school or elsewhere?

PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES

Enjoyment of physical activity


- 81% of primary pupils said that they enjoy physical activity 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'. 80% of Year 8 pupils and 67% of Year 10 pupils said the same.
- 67% of Year 6 girls thought they were 'fit' or 'very fit'. 41% of Year 8 and 23% of Year 10 girls said the same.
- 39% of primary aged pupils said that they had been physically active 5 times or more, for over an hour in the previous week. 34% of secondary aged pupils said the same. More boys than girls said this.

? What facilities are available for youngsters to be active? Are boys encouraged more than girls are?

INTERNET

What do you use the Internet for?

- 64% of primary pupils said that they use the Internet for schoolwork, 84% of secondary pupils said the same.
- More boys than girls use the Internet for playing games at secondary age: 85% of boys and 83% of girls in the primary sector play games on the Internet. This compared with 82% of Year 8 and 73% of Year 10 boys, but only 64% of Year 8 and 43% of Year 10 girls who said the same.
- 19% of primary pupils and 76% of secondary pupils use Facebook, MySpace, Twitter etc.

TRENDS

Solihull schools also surveyed in 2004, 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2012, some possible emerging trends include:

- 37% of Year 6 pupils in 2006 said they could 'usually or always' say no when a friend asked them to do something they didn't want to do. This has risen steadily to 54% of pupils saying the same in 2014.
- There has been a downward trend for Primary aged pupils saying that they drank alcohol in the previous week: 17% of Year 6 pupils said they drank alcohol in 2004, this has steadily fallen to the 3% reported in 2014.
- There had been an upward trend for Primary pupils reporting that their teachers had talked with them about growing up: In 2004, 39% of Year 6 pupils reported this and it rose steadily to 62% reported in 2012 but has fallen back slightly to 60% in 2014.
- There is an upward trend across all age groups for pupils who say they have never tried smoking at all: in 2014 for example 92% of Year 8 pupils said they had never smoked at all, this has risen steadily from the 66% of Year 8 pupils who said the same in 2004.
- 39% of secondary pupils in 2006 said they they know someone personally who uses drugs. This figure has fallen steadily across the years and in 2014 it is now 21%.
- There has been a downward trend for Secondary aged pupils saying that they eat crisps 'on most days': 30% of pupils said they had crisps in 2006, this has steadily fallen to the 25% reported in 2014.
- There has been a steady decline in proportions of secondary aged pupils saying that they or their friends carried weapons or other things for protection when they go out. 19% of Year 10 pupils reported this in 2004, this has dropped to 7% in 2014.
- There has been an upward trend for girls saying they would like to lose weight: In 2006, 55% of Year 10 girls said this, in 2007, it increased to 56%, by 2010, 59% of girls said this and in 2012, 60% said the same. In 2014, 66% of Year 10 girls said they would like to lose weight.

The Way Forward – over to you

We are grateful to the teachers, schools, and young people for their time and contributions to this survey. As a result of their work we have excellent data to be used by schools as well as by both statutory and voluntary agencies that support the health and wellbeing of children and young people in Solihull.
