Guidance

Emergency planning and response for education, childcare, and children's social care settings

How educational and childcare settings should plan for and deal with emergencies, including significant public health incidents and severe weather.

- ➤ Your plan should explain how you would respond if you needed to take any temporary actions in the event of an emergency including significant public health incidents and severe weather and consideration of Martyn's Law.
- The aim of an emergency plan is to help you and your staff plan for and respond effectively to an emergency. The emergency could happen at the setting or on an educational visit or outing.

Home Office Definition of Domestic Abuse and Abuse (DVA)

Any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behavior, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over who are or have been intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality.

This can encompass, but is not limited to, the following types of

abuse:

- psychological
- physical
- sexual
- financial
- emotional





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Controlling behaviour is a range of acts designed to make a person subordinate and/or dependent by isolating them from sources of support, exploiting their resources and capacities for personal gain, depriving them of the means needed for independence, resistance and escape and regulating their everyday behaviour.

Coercive behaviour is: an act or a pattern of acts of assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to harm, punish, or frighten their victim

Domestic violence effects 1 in 4 women

2 women a week are murdered by abusive/partner/ex -partner



1.6 million women in England and Wales experienced DVA in the year ending March 2023

Why doesn't she leave?

























Asking has a huge impact – even if the answer is NO.

Disclosure is often a process – keep asking.

Importance of asking the question

The woman feels listened to and is more likely to tell someone in future.

The woman knows where to go for help in the future.



How to ask safely



Are they alone? Do they have children or family with them?



Do you need an interpreter?



Have you recorded your concerns and actions?



Are you in a private room?

The best outcomes for children are achieved when both mother and children are understood to be victims of abuse and supported accordingly.



Questions to ask

Is everything ok at home?

Do you ever feel afraid?

Does anyone try to stop you doing things you like to do?

Does a partner, ex-partner, or anyone at home put you down, humiliate you or try to control what you do?

Have you ever been hurt or threatened by a partner or anyone at home?



You're not thinking about your children

Why didn't you leave sooner?

Unhelpful Responses

If you don't want to tell the police, I'm not sure there's anything else I can do to help Everyone feels stressed at the moment.

I'm worried about you, and I think you need to leave ASAP
