Don't ignore it

Listen to your instincts. It might be nothing, but it could be something. And it could be the one thing that keeps a child safe.

Observe the situation

Take notice. What's been seen or heard? Write it down if that helps you remember.

Think: if not you, then who? It's normal to worry about getting involved, or getting it wrong. But what if nobody else has noticed? We can all play a part to help keep children safe.



Speak up

Share concerns with someone who can help – this could be a safeguarding professional like a teacher. Or contact the NSPCC Helpline with any worry, big or small.


