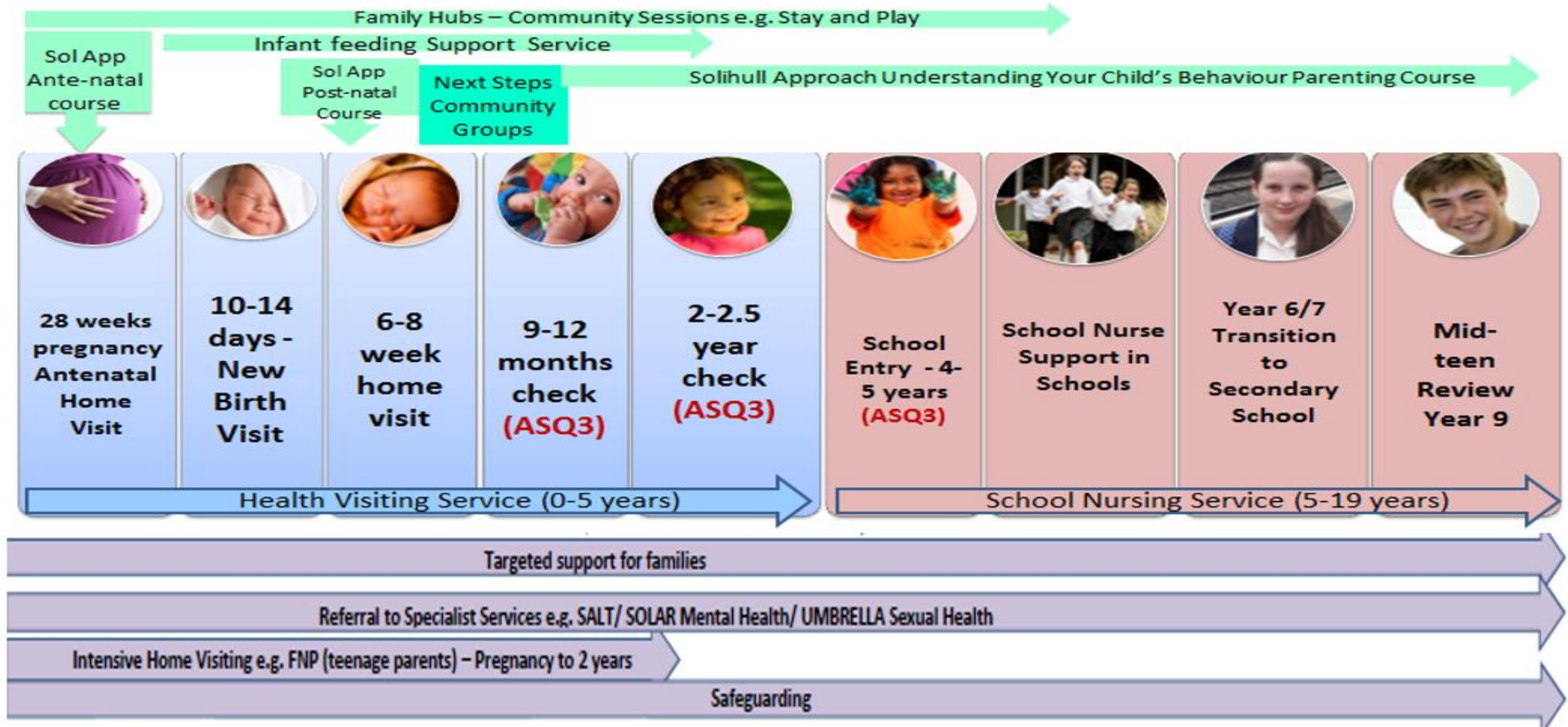

Healthy Child Programme in Solihull (0-19 years)



Health Visiting Service

- Carry out 5 mandated health and development checks:
 - 28 weeks pregnant
 - 10-14 days after birth visit
 - 6-8 weeks after birth home visit
 - 9-12 month development check (ASQ-3)
 - 2-2.5 year development check (ASQ-3)
- Provide support and advice to families
- Make referrals to specialist services



Infant Feeding Support Service

- UNICEF Full Gold Baby Friendly Accreditation
- Range of support offered to women:
 - Breastfeeding Cafes
 - Breast Pump Loan
 - Specialist home support
 - Training Programme
 - Website, Feeding Friend app, Facebook support

Family Nurse Partnership

FNP is a voluntary, intensive programme for first time young parents, aged 19 or under (21 if care experienced) from pregnancy until 2

Aims to enable young mums to:

- Have a healthy pregnancy
- Improve their child's health and development through effective parenting
- Plan their own futures and achieve their aspirations



School Nursing Team

- Health Needs Assessments – questionnaires at school entry, Year 6 and Year 9
- Heights and weights checks for the mandated National Child Measurement Programme
- Vision screening for Reception children
- Health advice and support
- Training
- Group sessions – e.g. school readiness
- Chat Health – text messaging service for Solihull 11-18 year olds to send confidential SMS text messages to School Nurses between 8:00am to 5:00pm Monday to Friday – **07520615730**. Or for parents/ carers- **07480635469**

Scope and Challenges



~8,500 health checks are carried out from pregnancy to 2 and a further ~6,000 for school children

Health Visiting care for ~10,400 children under 5

School Nursing provides a service for approx. 38,000 children and young people aged 5-19

~10 full-time equivalent School Nurses with School Nurse Assistants

Need to ensure the spec reflects best practice and local needs

Need to integrate effectively with other services

Need to address inequalities: large disparities in level of need/life expectancy/outcomes

Key Areas of Focus in New Service Specification

Reducing baby deaths

Early childhood development

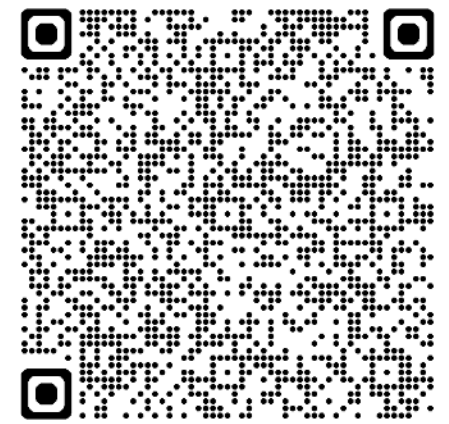
Support with being ready for school

Integrate with other early help services - supporting with issues early to stop them from getting worse

Addressing risky behaviour in older children and young people

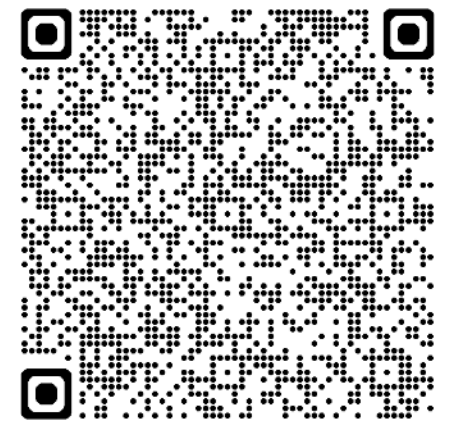
